INTERVIEW WITH TEACHER OF THE YEAR 2016 Jeffry Harris:

1. Share a humorous anecdote from your teaching life.

There were so many, that students have said funny things. One that I recall was when I asked a student if she knew her chord positions, she very excitedly responded, "Yes. Root position, first invasion, and second invasion." The student was 9 years old.



2. What experiences or musicians have particularly influenced your style of teaching?

Harry Franklin, my pre-college teacher in Pittsburgh. Probably the greatest influence in my teaching comes from those with whom I have studied as an adult -- Karen Shaw from Indiana University, Maria Clodes Jaguaribe from Boston University and Sheila Paige, with whom I have worked privately. Also, Hanna Li, from Carnegie Mellon University, who said to me when I first started teaching in the Preparatory School there, that if my students are going to perform, they should sound

as good as me, or better, because they are practicing (and I may not be). This was HUGE influence in my teaching. I took that ball and ran with it.

3. What unusual or unexpected item or items might we find in your teaching studio? I have a huge stand-alone sign carved of wood, which an adult student gave me that says RELAX.

4. Share a quote?

"Music is enough for a lifetime, but a lifetime is not enough for music."— Rachmaninoff.

Steven & Terri Smith:

1. What motivates you to serve this organization?

Thirty-five years ago I joined PMTA to be a better and more active liaison between the independent teachers and Penn State. Of course I hoped to get more and better students for us at PSU! 4. What vision do you have for the future?

I hope for more highly motivated professionals of all the age groups, as well as more musicians of other disciplines, not only pianists, all willing to give something of themselves as well as enjoy the benefits, which are obvious. If we want good, well-motivated students, we need well-run student activities for them, and we need the motivation and challenge of excellent professional activities for ourselves. Certification Projects - Not Just a Means to an End!

In June 2012 I relocated from Harrisburg to Lancaster and was faced with the prospect of opening a new studio. In 1986 when I started teaching in Harrisburg, through the auspices of my teacher, Julia Benfer and the generosity of a teacher who was closing her studio, I stumbled into 25-30 students! Instant studio. I knew I was not going to be that lucky this time around.

I of course joined the Lancaster Music Teachers Association and reached out to some area teachers and then looked on MTNA website for some ideas and found myself reading a tutorial, *Certification 101 by Sue A Steck-Turner*

(https://www.mtna.org/resources/certification-articles/certification-101/). I found project # 3, *Video Presentation of Teaching,* to be particularly interesting. While the project is focused on the teacher's teaching method, it occurred to me that recording lessons can also benefit students. Potential benefits would:

- provide a tool to track a student's progress
- provide the student with a tool to review what was covered in a weekly lesson
- provide a visual reference for their posture and hand position
- offer some variety to a student's weekly practice routine

In this tutorial Ms. Steck-Turner addresses some of the challenges of video recording if you are technologically challenged. I would propose letting students take turns recording each other on their cell phones as a jumping off point.

The author also suggests soliciting the help of a parent. I would also propose asking a high school student who is tech savvy. Think of how many of our students are involved in school musicals and plays. While I taught at Bishop McDevitt in Harrisburg I had a choir member

who was involved in the weekly productions of a student run morning video that covered the school's activities. He helped me do some video recordings of the choir as we prepared for concerts and competitions.

One other idea I would offer concerning this project. Ms. Steck-Turner suggests starting this project in the fall when students are beginning new repertoire. Summer would be a great time to gather your resources and experiment with some equipment and potentially learn a new skill.

The certification process does require some thought and planning. While this particular project is designed to present the teacher's skills, video tapping students does not have to end with certification. It can become a valuable tool in your teaching repertoire.

Scam Warnings!

'Tis the season for unscrupulous individuals to try to scam the honest, unsuspecting music teacher! They come in all different packages — the 'talented' child — what is your fee — your studio owes money, etc. And they're getting a little more sophisticated each year. If you don't recognize the sender, DON'T RESPOND!

It is sometimes difficult to spot a genuine student inquiry from a scam, especially if you are based in the area where the email might originate. Most of the time these emails originate from an overseas source. There are patterns to scams which could contain many of these elements:

- Poor English, poor spelling and punctuation, incomplete sentences.
- Demands for a ridiculous teaching schedule like "one hour lesson every day for four weeks"
- Can't meet in person immediately because they're traveling
- Strange travel and accommodation requests for the child
- Pupil is always very talented

- Attempts to dictate terms to you rather than asking for your terms
- No phone number
- Greeting does not use your name, but rather "Hello"
- Does not refer to an actual instrument, but rather generalizations such as 'music lessons'
- Uses a hotmail, yahoo or other disposable email account
- Requests an address for sending you money, generally several hundred dollars

Ignore emails containing any of the above! And NEVER accept payment by wire transfer or checks by mail - ALWAYS in person.

If the email says your studio owes money, it's a scam — another scare tactic.

Companies, collection agencies or the IRS will NEVER contact individuals via email, text or phone. Craigslist is another playground for these individuals. It is highly recommended that you DON'T advertise for lessons on Craigslist.
